Funding:

1. Cork County Council are delighted to announce that applications for funding are now open as part of our €1.8m Community Fund Scheme. The scheme is administered locally by the eight Municipal Districts and each year provides financial assistance to a range of different community, sporting and voluntary organisations under three distinctive fund types: The Capital Fund, Community Contract and Amenity Fund. Applications close at 4pm on Tuesday, 15th February 2022. Link 2. The Government announce €100 payment to all domestic electricity

accounts. The scheme will be operated by the Distribution System Operator (ESB Networks) by virtue of its existing interface with all electricity suppliers. ESB Networks will make payments to the individual energy suppliers. Link 3. The Built Heritage Investment Scheme and Historic Structures Fund 2022 are open for applications until 16:00 on Monday, 31st January 2022.

Project supports will range from a minimum of €2,500 to a maximum of

€15,000 per application. This scheme will support small-scale conservation projects and support the employment of skilled and experienced conservation professionals, craftspeople and tradespersons in the repair of the historic built environment. Link 4. The Community Monuments Fund 2022 is open for public applications until 17:00 on Tuesday, 15th February 2022. Malcom Noonan, Minister of State for Heritage and Electoral Reform, has launched the 2022 Community

Monuments Fund, which will invest €5 million in the protection and promotion of archaeological heritage in 2022 - a significant increase on the €2 million allocation made available for the Scheme in 2021, which saw eight successful projects in the county of Cork. The Community Monuments Fund has 3 Streams:

Stream 1 will offer grants up to €85,000 aimed at essential repairs

and capital works for the conservation and repair of archaeological Stream 2 will offer grants of up to €30,000 for development of Conservation Management Plans/Reports that are aimed at

identifying measures for conservation of archaeological monuments and improving public access. Stream 3 will offer grants of up to €30,000 for enhancement of

access infrastructure and interpretation (including virtual/online) at archaeological monuments. 5. Cork County Council has allocated over €700,000 to community groups

With €500,000 allocated every year over the last 7 years, Cork County Council established the Community Development Initiative to fund local community development projects, with supports ranging from €1,000 to

from across the county under Phase 2 of a €3.5 million fund.

Cork County Council received 241 applications with 132 successful community groups approved for funding this week by the Council's three Local Community Development Committees. The projects approved range from the refurbishment of community halls, the upgrading of walkways, equipment purchases such as tables, chairs and mowers, plus many more vital items which will improve the quality of amenities for all residents of Cork County.

The conference is an annual event hosted jointly between The Rivers Trust and
