FUNDING 01. Minister Humphreys announces details of new €15 million Community Centre Fund. The Minister for Rural and Community Development, Heather Humphreys TD, has today announced a new €15 million capital fund to support community groups for the upgrade and refurbishment of Community Centres. This is an investment in both rural and urban communities

costs from the applicants own funds.

The Community Centres Investment Fund will support community groups with the upgrade and development of their Community Centre facilities.

Funding will be available under 3 Categories with grants of between €10k and €300K available: Category 1: Small scale projects/improvements to facilities - €10,000 to €25,000. Category 2: Larger scale projects - €25,001 to €100,000. Category 3: Major projects- €100,001 to €300,000.

Applications under Category 2 and 3 must include a minimum contribution of 5% of the total project

Registration will open on Tuesday 3rd May 2022, applicants need to register as 'users' on the portal in advance of the application process opening on Tuesday 7th June 2022. The closing date for

applications is Thursday 14th July 2022. The Department will be hosting a number of online information events in May and June 2022 to provide guidance in relation to the application process and details will be released in due course.

Guidelines and a sample application form are now available at Link 03. Department of Rural and Community Development supports available in 2022. It is hoped that this calendar will assist stakeholders by providing timeframes in

which to develop high quality and impactful funding proposals. Link 04. Under the Community Monuments Fund 2022, operated by the National Monuments Service of

the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage, four applications from Cork County were successful. These applicants include projects and undertakings in respect of Castleview

Mills: Dromtarriffe Church, Coolbane Mill and Templebreedy Graveyard Crosshaven, being awarded a combined sum of €212,220. The Heritage Council also announced awardees from three schemes including the Irish Walled Town Network Grant Scheme, the Heritage Stewardship Scheme and the Heritage Council's Community Heritage Grant Scheme 2022. Eleven different projects in County Cork are being supported under these schemes to the sum of €181,119.

Four successful projects in Bandon, Buttevant and Youghal will receive a combined €93,549 under the Irish Walled Town Network Grant Scheme. Under the Heritage Stewardship Scheme a

digitisation project regarding Irish Tourist Association Files by Cork County Council's Library and Arts Service was successful. Six applications under the Heritage Council's Community Heritage Grant Scheme 2022 were successful including €20,000 for the re-rendering of the Church of the Ascension in Timoleague; €20,000 for a conservation plan for Kingston College in Mitchelstown; a combined display of Conserved Ledgers, Bible and Puxley Papers in Allihies Copper Mines Museum received €13,924; Cork LGBT Archive Community Heritage was funded €9,750; a conservation plan for the Sirius Arts Centre in Cobh received €10,000 and the conservation and display of two processional banners in St. Mary's Church, Mallow were funded €10,441. Across the four aforementioned schemes, the combined level of funding is €393,339 for 15 different heritage projects and undertakings across Cork County.

05. Rethink Ireland are thrilled to announce the launch of our Impact for Munster Fund. This €750,000 Fund aims to support not-for-profit organisations working to enhance the physical and mental health of communities across Munster. This one-year Fund was created in partnership with the Parkes Family (Limerick), the Sunflower Charitable Foundation, Community Foundation for Ireland, and a number of private donors, with match funding from the Department of Rural and Community Development via the Dormant Accounts Fund. Up to 10 awardees will receive a

package of supports, including: 1. A Cash grant of up to a maximum of €65.000 2. A place on Rethink Ireland's capacity building Programme 3. One to one mentoring support tailored the specific needs of each project We invite applications from projects: • Working towards improving the physical and mental health of their beneficiaries

Cycle Against Suicide is running a Community Buddy programme which is available free of

charge to all community groups. This programme trains individuals in communities how to have a structured but supportive conversation in a safe and non-judgemental space. It allows an individual to discuss how they are coping or not coping, and working together, the individual working with the Buddy discuss (co-produce) ways of moving forward to overcome the challenges. During our

Community Buddy training, participants will be educated on how stress and mental health problems can affect individuals. They will be instructed in the skills of active listening. They will be trained in the use of a structured interview schedule to ascertain whether individuals might be experiencing significant levels of distress and how to practically manage distressed individuals. Furthermore, they will be trained to mentor individuals to take positive resilience enhancing actions, such as positive coping. They will be trained on how to recognise more complex symptoms requiring professional interventions. They will develop skills based on the principal of motivational mentoring to encourage individuals to speak with a healthcare professional where necessary.
