



Group of the Week : Cavermona Ireland

- The hereditary form of cavernoma is recognised as a rare disease.
- Cavernoma is also known as: Cavernous Angioma, Cavernous Haemangioma or Cerebral Cavernous Malformation(CCM).



😕 What is a Cavernoma?

Linkage Groups

Linkage Groups bring together stakeholder organisations and groups who are members of the PPN with a common interest to discuss their diverse views and interests in a specific policy area.

This is a pathway for such organisations and groups to have a real input into policy in their respective area of operation.

Linkage Groups are an essential component of the work of the PPN.

They are independent networks of community groups who are interested in a common theme such as Arts, Community, Environment, Heritage, Housing, Planning, Social Inclusion, Transport or Tourism (and more).

Linkage Groups work to influence change. They do this through advocating for policy changes on behalf of the community through PPN Reps engaging with Cork County Council and other bodies appropriate to the issue or subject matter of advocacy.

After our recent Plenary meeting, we are proposing four Linkage Groups:

- 1. Housing, Planning, Transport and Community Safety
- 2. Arts, Community, Heritage and Tourism
- 3. Climate Change, Water and Environment
- 4. Social Inclusion, Rural Development, Youth, Enterprise & Recreation

By making submissions to a Linkage Group, you can support our SPC and LCDC Reps and give them a mandate to bring to the Council.



Get involved! Secretariat Vacancies:

Cork County PPN has a number of vacancies available, some on the various Committees within the County Council - the SPCs and LDCDs, but at the moment we also have a number of positions we are looking to fill on our Secretariat - the incredibly important group that keeps the PPN show on the road !

The Cork County PPN Secretariat provides a coordinating and oversight function for the PPN. Its role is to:

- Facilitate the implementation of decisions of the PPN
- Ensure the proper functioning of the PPN between plenary meetings
- Coordinate the activities of the PPN Communicate extensively and regularly with all PPN members and disseminate information concerning all PPN activities as widely as possible
- Manage and support PPN staff The Secretariat is made up of two representatives from each of the Cork County Municipal Districts i.e. Carrigaline, Macroom, Cobh, East Cork, Bandon-Kinsale, Fermoy, Kanturk-Mallow and West Cork, as well as, two representatives from each of the PPN colleges i.e. Community & Voluntary College, Social Inclusion College and Environmental College.

Commitment Involved:

The Secretariat role is voluntary and requires approximately two hours per month to attend meetings, which generally take place at 7:00 PM on the third Tuesday of each month, alternating between in-person and online formats. Travel expenses for in-person meetings are reimbursed. Additional involvement may be required from time to time, such as participation in sub-groups or events.

This is a rewarding opportunity for individuals to contribute meaningfully to the social fabric of our communities. Secretariat members receive access to training and national events, develop key skills, and play a crucial role in shaping supports for community groups, particularly those representing marginalised voices.

Vhi Health & Wellbeing Fund Open for Applications

Vhi are partnering with the Irish Youth Foundation again this year to manage the 2025 Vhi Health & Wellbeing Fund.

A fund of \in 85,000 is available to community-based projects and programmes that are focused on empowering young people aged 12-25 year under the following two focus areas:

- 1. The fund will support projects that seek to strengthen resilience in young people and help them manage anxiety, with the emphasis on early intervention and prevention. Projects may work directly with young people or with the adults that surround them.
- 2. The fund is looking to support projects in the six locations where Vhi have offices; **Cork, Donegal, Dublin, Galway, Kilkenny and Limerick.**

To be eligible the applying organisation must:

- Work with young people aged between 12-25 years old
- Be a registered not-for-profit or charitable organisation
- The organisation must have a bank account set up in the name of the organisation
- Be registered in the Republic of Ireland and active in Ireland for the past 12 months
- The organisation must have a child protection policy in place.

Training:

Please Help Us Reduce Waste and Maximise PPN Resources

We regret we have to say this:

We're facing a challenge that impacts our ability to serve you, our fabulous PPN members, effectively, and we need your help.

Recently, we've seen a significant number of people who register for our free trainings and events but do not attend. For example:

- At our Spring Plenary on May 1st, only **50% of registered attendees showed up**. This resulted in a shameful amount of food waste, despite us sending attendees home absolutely laden down with leftovers.
- Just this week, **26 people registered** for our "Beginner's Guide to Facebook Ads" training, yet **only 3 logged in**.

While we understand that unforeseen circumstances can arise, this trend has serious implications for Cork County PPN. As the largest county in Ireland, Cork County PPN operates on the same budget as much smaller counties. This means our finances are already stretched.

We are committed to offering free, high-quality training to our PPN members. However, these trainings are not without cost to us; we pay trainers from our limited budget. When attendance is low, it means we're not making the best use of your PPN's money.

Earlier this year, we conducted a training needs analysis to ensure we're offering relevant topics at convenient times. The low attendance at recent events makes us question if we're meeting your needs as effectively as possible.

If we had known about the limited interest in the event, we could have postponed the training, reallocated funds, or even offered the training to other PPNs, allowing more groups to benefit.



We kindly ask that you **only register for events and trainings if you are confident you can attend**. If you've registered and your plans change, please notify us as soon as possible.

This simple action will help us:

- Minimise food waste at future events.
- Allocate our budget more effectively to provide valuable resources.
- Ensure that everyone who wants to participate has the opportunity.

PCSA Policing Priorities Online Consultation - Have Your Say

The Policing and Community Safety Authority (PCSA) is the new oversight body for An Garda Síochána. The PCSA sets the Policing Priorities and these establish what we want the Gardaí to give the most attention and resources to, in order to deliver an effective policing service for you and to make people feel safe in their communities.

The PCSA is currently reaching out to people and communities across Ireland to hear their views on what the Policing Priorities should be for An Garda Síochána for 2026-2028. As part of this consultation, we have launched an online consultation tool that allows you to spend 'points' on the areas of policing that you consider a priority. It will take about 10 minutes to complete, and there is a short, optional survey at the end.
