The projects were designed to align with the Government of Ireland's Town Centre First Policy and focused on themes such as accessibility, wellbeing, community use of public spaces, sense of belonging, environment, vacancy and dereliction.

## Linkage Groups

**Linkage Groups** bring together stakeholder organisations and groups who are members of the PPN with a common interest to discuss their diverse views and interests in a specific policy area.

This is a pathway for such organisations and groups to have a real input into policy in their respective area of operation.

Linkage Groups are an essential component of the work of the PPN.

They are independent networks of community groups who are interested in a common theme such as Arts, Community, Environment, Heritage, Housing, Planning, Social Inclusion, Transport or Tourism (and more).

Linkage Groups work to influence change. They do this through advocating for policy changes on behalf of the community through PPN Reps engaging with Cork County Council and other bodies appropriate to the issue or subject matter of advocacy.

#### After our recent Plenary meeting, we are proposing four Linkage Groups:

- 1. Housing, Planning, Transport and Community Safety
- 2. Arts, Community, Heritage and Tourism
- 3. Climate Change, Water and Environment
- 4. Social Inclusion, Rural Development, Youth, Enterprise & Recreation

# Importance of Linkage Groups

My name is Raffaella and I'm part of an environmental group in County Cork that is a member of the Public Participation Network.

I was nominated Representative for the PPN in one of the Strategic Policy Committees, the Environment, Climate Action and Biodiversity one.

I have the privilege of participating in the meetings of this committee in Cork County Council and work together with the elected Councillors and the other representatives, to formulate, develop and review the policies of the Council and to have the opportunity to be fully involved in the policy making process.

My role, and the role of all the other PPN Representatives sitting in different Strategic Policy Committees, is to be representative of the PPN as a whole and to do this we need the help of the community and voluntary groups that are part of the PPN.

Each group can participate in a Linkage group and bring forward their ideas, suggestions, issues that the Representatives then can present at the Committee meetings.

I really encourage you to be part of one or more of the Linkage groups that were established at our last Plenary meeting:

- 1. Housing, Planning, Transport and Community Safety
- 2. Arts, Community, Heritage and Tourism
- 3. Climate Change, Water and Environment

### Get involved! Secretariat Vacancies:

Cork County PPN has a number of vacancies available, some on the various Committees within the County Council - the SPCs and LDCDs, but at the moment we also have a number of positions we are looking to fill on our Secretariat - the incredibly important group that keeps the PPN show on the road!

The Cork County PPN Secretariat provides a coordinating and oversight function for the PPN. Its role is to:

- Facilitate the implementation of decisions of the PPN
- Ensure the proper functioning of the PPN between plenary meetings
- Coordinate the activities of the PPN Communicate extensively and regularly with all PPN members and disseminate information concerning all PPN activities as widely as possible
- Manage and support PPN staff The Secretariat is made up of two representatives from each of the Cork County Municipal Districts i.e. Carrigaline, Macroom, Cobh, East Cork, Bandon-Kinsale, Fermoy, Kanturk-Mallow and West Cork, as well as, two representatives from each of the PPN colleges i.e. Community & Voluntary College, Social Inclusion College and Environmental College.

#### Commitment Involved:

The Secretariat role is voluntary and requires approximately two hours per month to attend meetings, which generally take place at 7:00 PM on the third Tuesday of each month, alternating between in-person and online formats. Travel expenses for in-person meetings are reimbursed. Additional involvement may be required from time to time, such as participation in sub-groups or events.

This is a rewarding opportunity for individuals to contribute meaningfully to the social fabric of our communities. Secretariat members receive access to training and national events, develop key skills, and play a crucial role in shaping supports for community groups, particularly those representing marginalised voices.

# COUNTYWIDE SAFETY BULLETIN -SUMMER DRIVING TIPS



With the arrival of summer, roads become busier with bicycles, motorcycles, caravans, agricultural vehicles, visiting tourists and increased traffic congestion. It is crucial to exercise caution and vigilance, particularly during school holidays when more children are present, and their actions may be unpredictable due to their limited awareness of vehicle-related dangers. Here are some tips for safe driving during the summer months:

- 1. Sunny weather can serve as a major incentive to get people out on the roads. The more drivers on the road, the greater chance that accidents will occur.
- 2. Reduce speed in built up areas and near cyclists.
- 3. Pedestrians increase over summer months so be extra vigilant in urban areas and near parks and beaches.
- 4. Exercise extreme caution when reversing. Adopt a reverse in, drive out policy.
- 5. Summer is a peak period of activity for farmers. Tractor cabs are often sound proofed and drivers may be wearing ear protectors so may not be able to hear approaching cars.
- 6. Take particular care driving in the early morning, dusk and nighttime when animals and agricultural vehicles are more likely to be on the roads.
- 7. Drive defensively, anticipate unsafe actions by others, adhere to road signs & signals.
- 8. Do not ignore driver fatigue. Resist the temptation to 'push on' when tired and prioritise getting sufficient rest. Regular breaks every two hours.
- 9. Driving in hot conditions is liable to play havoc on your car's engine. Check coolant levels and take regular breaks.



- 10. Dazzling sunlight can blind drivers and is a regular cause of accidents. Keep your windscreen clean and the windshield fluid topped up.
- 11. The glare off a wet road in summer can be blinding, be aware of the possibility of these conditions.
- 12. Check your tyre pressure, high temperature can aggravate any existing damage to the rubber in your tyres.
- 13. Road resurfacing is at its peak during the summer months. Expect narrow roads, slower speed limits and construction workers and machines on the road.
- 14. Respect the 'cone zone' when driving through road works.
- 15. Loose chippings can be kicked up by other cars moving at speed and can crack headlamps and windscreens. Respect the temporary speed limit on these roads.
- 16. Be mindful after a dry period if a summer storm occurs as rainfall can cause slippery road surfaces. Mind your speed in these instances.
