Linkage Groups bring together stakeholder organisations and groups who are members of the PPN with a common interest to discuss their diverse views and interests in a specific policy area.

This is a pathway for such organisations and groups to have a real input into policy in their respective area of operation.

Linkage Groups are an essential component of the work of the PPN.

They are independent networks of community groups who are interested in a common theme such as Arts, Community, Environment, Heritage, Housing, Planning, Social Inclusion, Transport or Tourism (and more).

Linkage Groups work to influence change. They do this through advocating for policy changes on behalf of the community through PPN Reps engaging with Cork County Council and other bodies appropriate to the issue or subject matter of advocacy.

After our recent Plenary meeting, we are proposing four Linkage Groups:

- 1. Housing, Planning, Transport and Community Safety
- 2. Arts, Community, Heritage and Tourism
- 3. Climate Change, Water and Environment
- 4. Social Inclusion, Rural Development, Youth, Enterprise & Recreation

Get involved! Secretariat Vacancies:

Cork County PPN has a number of vacancies available, some on the various Committees within the County Council - the SPCs and LDCDs, but at the moment we also have a number of positions we are looking to fill on our Secretariat - the incredibly important group that keeps the PPN show on the road !

The Cork County PPN Secretariat provides a coordinating and oversight function for the PPN. Its role is to:

- Facilitate the implementation of decisions of the PPN
- Ensure the proper functioning of the PPN between plenary meetings
- Coordinate the activities of the PPN Communicate extensively and regularly with all PPN members and disseminate information concerning all PPN activities as widely as possible
- Manage and support PPN staff The Secretariat is made up of two representatives from each of the Cork County Municipal Districts i.e. Carrigaline, Macroom, Cobh, East Cork, Bandon-Kinsale, Fermoy, Kanturk-Mallow and West Cork, as well as, two representatives from each of the PPN colleges i.e. Community & Voluntary College, Social Inclusion College and Environmental College.

Commitment Involved:

The Secretariat role is voluntary and requires approximately two hours per month to attend meetings, which generally take place at 7:00 PM on the third Tuesday of each month, alternating between in-person and online formats. Travel expenses for in-person meetings are reimbursed. Additional involvement may be required from time to time, such as participation in sub-groups or events.

This is a rewarding opportunity for individuals to contribute meaningfully to the social fabric of our communities. Secretariat members receive access to training and national events, develop key skills, and play a crucial role in shaping supports for community groups, particularly those representing marginalised voices.

Research Ireland Infrastructure Programme

The Research Ireland Infrastructure Programme supports the research community in building and sustaining essential resources to conduct high-quality, innovative research across all disciplines. This programme recognises that robust research infrastructure is fundamental to advancing knowledge that contributes to Ireland's cultural, social, environmental and economic development.

Research Ireland encourages the efficient use, renewal and development of existing infrastructure while also advocating for continued investment in state-of-the-art facilities and resources across diverse research areas of importance. The Infrastructure Programme aims to foster interdisciplinary collaboration and ensure all researchers have access to the resources necessary for excellence in their respective fields.

Applications to the 2025 Programme Call will support significant infrastructure investments across all disciplines within Research Ireland's remit. The programme welcomes proposals for substantial resources that enhance research capabilities in diverse fields, recognising the different infrastructure requirements of various research traditions.

Applications to the 2025 Programme Call will have a minimum budget request of €500,000 direct costs. An additional 10% cash cost share is mandatory in all applications; therefore, the total infrastructure cost must be at least €550,000. There is no maximum budget request.

The Programme will be run in collaboration with the Sustainable Energy Authority of Ireland (SEAI).

2025 LGBTIQ+ Community Services Fund Opens for Applications

The Minister for Children, Disability and Equality, Norma Foley today (27 June) announced that applications can now be made for funding from the LGBTIQ+ Community Services Fund.

The 2025 LGBTIQ+ Community Services Funding Call is an important element in supporting the implementation of the National LGBTIQ+ Inclusion Strategy II 2024-2028, which was published in June 2025

Announcing the opening of the 2025 fund, Minister Foley said: "I am delighted to announce the opening of the 2025 LGBTIQ+ Community Services Fund, which provides vital funding to organisations throughout the country to support LGBTIQ+ people and to provide crucial services to the LGBTIQ+ community.

2025 marks the fifth year of the LGBTIQ+ Community Services Funding Call. The opening of the Funding Call coincides with Pride celebrations and recognises the key contribution made by LGBTIQ+ organisations to enable LGBTIQ+ people to participate fully in Ireland's social, economic, cultural, and political life.

The National LGBTIQ+ Inclusion Strategy II 2024-2028 was also published this year and outlines the Government's commitment to responding to continued challenges facing the LGBTIQ+ community and ensuring they are supported in realising their rights. "

Application details for the LGBTIQ+ Community Services Fund

There are two streams of funding under the LGBTIQ+ Community Services Fund

- Scheme A is open to applications from existing LGBTIQ+ NGOs and community organisations working with the LGBTIQ+ community to support new initiatives and to maintain and enhance existing services and initiatives.
- Scheme B will provide small grants to organisations for projects that promote visibility and inclusion of LGBTIQ+ persons.

All applications must be submitted electronically.

LOW	NO PROTECTION REQUIRED
1-2	Unless outdoors for extended periods, or near reflective surfaces such as snow or water.
MODERATE	PROTECTION REQUIRED
3-5	Slip on clothing. Slop on sunscreen, use sun protection factor (SPF) 30 for adults and 50 for children. Slap on a wide brimmed hat.
HIGH	Seek shade during midday hours.
6-7	Slide on sunglasses, wraparound are best.
VERY HIGH	EXTRA PROTECTION REQUIRED
8-10	Avoid being outside during midday hours. Make sure you seek shade.

We hope everyone enjoys the sun this weekend, but make sure to mind yourself!!

With more people spending time outside, it's important to protect your skin.

Protect yourself in five ways from skin cancer



For the best protection, use the five SunSmart steps:

- 1. Slip on covering clothing. Choose clothing that covers as much skin as possible, for example, collared shirts with long sleeves.
- 2. Slop on SPF 30 (or higher) broad-spectrum, water-resistant sunscreen.
- 3. Slap on a hat.
- 4. Seek shade.
- 5. Slide on some sunglasses.

As well as the 5 S's it is important to remember:

- In Ireland, the UV radiation levels are high from April to September, even when it is cloudy. Stay safe by limiting time in the sun when UV is strongest, typically between the hours of 11:00am-3:00pm
